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I'm pleased to share with you our latest trust newsletter which gives a very brief flavour of what has been going on across our family of schools. This term, like all terms, has been a busy one.

We started the academic year by bringing all our staff across our schools together to share good practice. It's one of my favourite events of the year, it's great to see our vision coming into fruition where staff feel part of our one Oak family but are also very proud of the identity and individuality of their school. At this event I spoke about our need to be vulnerable with one another to build strong relationships and be the best we can be for our pupils. We also launched our common framework for teaching, and we introduced our behaviour absolutes which is defining how we want our staff to aspire to behave. We have also been working on our approach to wellbeing and ensuring our people are well looked after. Often for me running high quality schools isn't that complicated it is about ensuring staff are well looked after, making sure teaching is the best it can possibly be, and ensuring the culture is one where people behave with mutual respect and do everything possible in the interest of getting the best outcomes for our pupils.

Very early this term we received a visit from Ofsted at Elms Bank, I'm very proud to say they were rated as Outstanding across all areas. This is no mean feat, the school hadn't been inspected for many years and has almost doubled in size and now on multiple sites, it's a huge achievement but well deserved. This term saw me officially become an Ofsted inspector; it will be a role I can fulfil alongside my current role as CEO completing around six inspections a year. I believe the training and insights I receive in this role will be invaluable for our schools as I will be able to share good practice and ideas with our leaders. I'm committed to raising standards in education outside of the trust but doing it with compassion and understanding. There have been other key staffing developments in the trust, Orienne Langley-Sadler has taken up the role of Executive Head and she will be supporting the trust with school improvement projects and growth, she remains the Head at Elms Bank but has capacity due to the talented senior team there. Claire Ferguson joined us as Chief Finance Officer, she joins us with a vast amount of experience of this role having previously worked for two other trusts and brings essential expertise with her.

It's been great to visit schools and see some of the festive events going on, but due to family commitments I was unable to attend the winter concert, my colleagues told me how wonderful it was to see pupils from all three schools perform at the same event. Due to the late finish, I'm now starting to be concerned about being prepared for my own family Christmas and my three children not being disappointed come Christmas day! I realise for some Christmas can be a difficult time and for others not a time for celebration, I hope you find some peace and rest in the break.

Lowercroft continues to be an associate member of the trust and are actively engaging in all our school improvements, they will join the trust in the future.

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Our Outreach offer is starting to grow and Nic Pemberton who successfully secured the post of Head of Outreach, the vision is to build a team of experts that can support our schools and schools outside of our trust, to be the best they can be for all their pupils.

As a trust the Local Authority have commissioned us to support a local Jewish Secondary School, Mesivta, and Paul Greenhalgh, Headteacher at Hazel Wood High School will be mentoring the new Headteacher there from January 2024.

We are also in conversations with a number of other local schools and hope to be able to officially share some further news around secondary and special growth in the future.

Our People Matter

As a trust we are dedicated to promoting staff wellbeing. As a group of schools, we have developed a trust wide wellbeing policy and have introduced a trust workload charter. To further develop our commitment to wellbeing we are thrilled to share that in January we will be collaborating with Welbee, a dedicated staff wellbeing improvement service.

- **Wellbeing Guides:** Comprehensive guides that will aid wellbeing and leadership development.

We look forward to receiving feedback from our staff when this is launched in January 2024.





Oak LP Outreach Update

Since the official launch of OakLP Outreach last academic year the team has brought together the network of Special Educational Needs coordinators from across the Bury authority.

OakLP Outreach have delivered four sessions of 'Making Sense of Autism' training to professionals across Bury this half term. This training aims to extend professionals understanding of how autism affects pupils in school and helps to increase their expertise in recognising a pupil's individual strengths and differences.

They are also working alongside the speech therapy team and the virtual school to deliver the primary Elklan course. To train professionals in Bury schools to support pupils with speech, language and communication difficulties and remove barriers to learning.

We have enjoyed another excellent start to the school year at Hazel Wood, and our staff have continued to dedicate themselves to ensuring that our students achieve their academic potential by providing them with a high-quality education.

As highlighted in our recent Ofsted inspection and in our external review in Nov 23, Hazel Wood continues to be a good school that students are happy to attend and where students wear their uniform with pride.

Last year at this time I wrote that we have celebrated the best results this school has seen in a long while, however, I am pleased to say that we beat them again this year! I am thrilled to report that based on the current validated DfE progress data, the school is now ranked the 2nd best in Bury, previously 5th in 2022 and 14th in 2019, and is therefore once again the most improved school in the Local Authority and potentially even wider! We have gone from the bottom 10% of schools in the UK in 2019 to being in the top 30% of schools in the UK with an above average progress score. This is a huge achievement showing the rewards of our hard work, and it feels so good to know that our students are going on the right future path and that we have a school we can be immensely proud of.

As always, we have continued to strive to enrich the lives of our students with a number of exciting activities and events. A particular highlight for myself during this term has been the positive role the school continues to play in the wider community, which is demonstrated through the charitable work and community events we have been involved in.
